

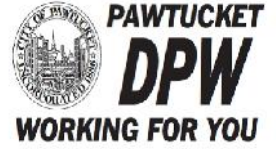

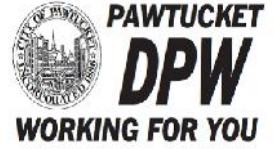
Terms and Conditions:

1. DPW will plant trees during the following calendar intervals: April 1st through June 15th (“Spring Interval”) and September 1st through October 31st (“Fall Interval”). Applications for Spring Interval planting must be received no later November 1st. Applications for Fall Interval planting must be received no later than June 1st.
2. The Department of Public Works will evaluate applications per the following guidelines:
 - **Joint applications (i.e. collaborative effort among neighbors) will be assigned highest priority.**
 - This program’s funding is limited each year. Applications that cannot be authorized due to funding constraints in a given year will be considered during the following year.
 - Installation of trees may be infeasible due to conflict with buried utilities, hydrants, overhead wires and utility poles, vehicular and pedestrian traffic considerations, and ADA accessibility regulations.
3. Except as noted in this agreement, all work shall be done according to City of Pawtucket Specifications for Right-Of-Way Alteration and State of Rhode Island Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction.
4. Contractor shall repair or replace any work or installation that may have become defective within 1 year of acceptance.
5. Trees are living organisms that require care and attention. Though the installer is responsible for the proper installation of a healthy plant, **perpetual maintenance of the tree is the responsibility of the applicant.** Recommended maintenance measures are included on the reverse side of this form.

How To Care For Your New Tree(s)

1. WATER (**the most important** maintenance measure)
 - a. Water each tree once a week with 15 to 20 gallons (about 3 to 4 large buckets) between May and October
 - b. Water slowly so the water penetrates the soil and does not run off of the surface
 - c. If it rains 1inch or more in a week's time period, you do not need to add water
2. MULCH
 - a. Mulch keeps the water from evaporating quickly, reduces soil compaction, inhibits weed growth, and improves the soil as it breaks down. Once a year in the Spring, apply a three-inch layer of mulch, preferably shredded bark, to the tree pit.
 - b. **Do not** pile the mulch against the trunk of the tree. This causes water to accumulate and rot the trunk.
3. REMOVE WEEDS
 - a. Wearing gloves, remove weeds. When removing the weeds, take out the entire root system. Leaving behind some of the plant material will allow for the weed to grow back. Use trowels to dig out stubborn roots.
 - b. Dispose of the uprooted weeds properly along with other yard waste.
